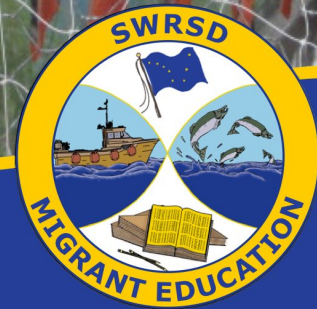
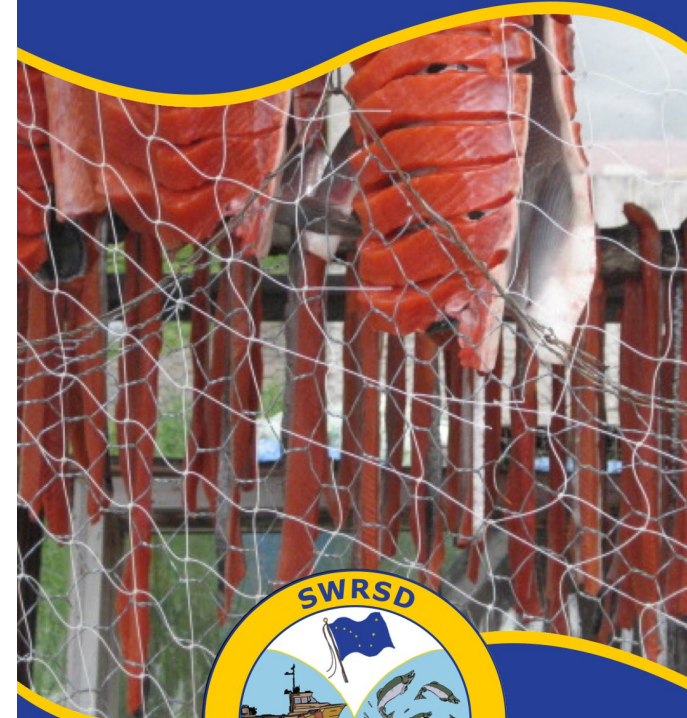

How does my child qualify?

To qualify, any or all of your children have to meet the following conditions:

- Traveled 20 miles one way or crossed school district boundaries to go commercial fishing, subsistence fishing, clamming or berry picking.
- Spent a total of 7 nights/8 days away from home doing 'qualifying' activities within a 12-month period (does not have to be consecutive nights).
- There is an economic need for the commercial or subsistence activities.
- Children ages birth to 20 (22 if the child is receiving special education services) can qualify for the program. However, once a child has graduated with a diploma, they no longer qualify for services.



Migrant Program Information & Facts

The primary goal of the migrant program is to assist in improving educational opportunities for migrant children to help meet the challenging state academic content, to graduate from high school, and be a responsible citizen of the community.

In the 2018-2019 there were about 268 children in Southwest Region School District that qualified for the migrant education program; 39% of the student body population.

All eight schools within the district have a migrant coordinator that can help organize or provide contact information for possible services for migrant children.

Migrant students receive free Alaska-themed, age appropriate books, fiction & non-fiction from the migrant education book program. About 7100 books and 200 games were distributed this year alone.

In 2018-2019, 16 migrant family nights occurred; two per site.

Program Services

- **Literacy at Home:** book series (fall), student selection (Dec-Mar), Alaska themed books & games send-out (Dec), Scholastic summer packs
- **PK-2nd Grade Summer Slide:** reading, writing, math workbooks
- **Family Nights:** Literacy and STEAM related activity nights (at least 2 per site per year)
- **PreK Early Learning:** information on early childhood learning and developmental milestones.

Other Services

The following services may be available to migrant children:

- Targeted Tutoring
- Behavioral Counseling
- Post secondary/career planning assistance
- College courses (dual-credit, in-school, out-of-school, & summer opportunities)
- Summer school
- Enrichment programs (ANSEP, Student Conservation Association, Student Government)

Other services may be provided at each individual site.
