

Staffing

We are working cooperatively with BBEDC with hiring a temporary employee to help with accounts payable and miscellaneous jobs. Danielle Maples began work on December 1 and will continue through January 30. Genny has come back part time and will re-evaluate her work schedule at the end of January. We are hoping to be fully staffed in February it has been very hard on the staff doing more than their job.

Budget Process

The budget process will begin in January by gathering each departments needs and get a preliminary look at what we will be able to fund for FY10. We don't' have revenue numbers yet but we can get preliminary expense numbers that can be adjusted when more is know.

Foundation Funding

We received final notice of our foundation for FY09 and it is \$68062 less than what is reflected in the budget. It is very important that all departments stay within their designated budget and if possible be under.

Spending

CURRICULUM & INSTRUCTION David Piazza, Director of Instructional Programs

Curriculum (Deb Endicott)

We were able to conduct a district wide writing assessment were a team of 9 teachers came into Dillingham and scored student written samples using the 6-Trait Writing System. The same system that is used to score the SBT and exit exams. Dave Piazza created a database that took four years of data and integrated it into a report showing each student's scores for the past four years. We then took this year's scoring results and added them to the report. Each student received their sample back with their current scores as well. Each teacher will be able to take those 4-year trend reports and design the instruction to the needs of the students.

Math in a Cultural Context (MCC/Yupik Math) art supplies and resource for teachers have been purchased and packaged into kits for easy distribution, organization, and use. These kits have been sent to those teachers who are using the supplemental math curriculum to support their teaching. The district utilized resources from the UF grant to purchase the materials needed for the Primary level modules.

Counseling/Assessments (Steve Ito)

The annual EED mandated Idea Proficiency Testing (IPT) coordinator training updates for spring Limited English Proficiency testing cycle were completed. The scores for the Fall HSGQE tests taken in October should be available on December 12th for review. We are in the process of identifying and training additional certified SPED staff to be Alternate Assessment Protégés for 2009 spring testing of severely cognitively disabled students. The Spring HSGQE & SBA district-wide testing enrollments have been submitted to EED. The scheduling of travel and registrations for 6 staff members chosen by site administrators to attend the 36th annual Bilingual Multicultural Education and Equity Conference in Anchorage January 28th – 30th is in being completed.

Student Records/PowerSchool Support (Nate Preston)

It appears that the OASIS and Foundation Count reports that the District submitted in November were processed by the State with no major changes. At last report, the funding levels for the district are based on the 633.5 students reported. While 4 students were also reported by other school district's, the students in question who were in our district during count period and have remained on our lists for funding.

eRate

Since the last written board report, we were contacted by the Program Assurance Integrity (PIA) team for additional information regarding the district's selection process used this past year. This is a normal request from PIA as they follow their checklist for approving our current year application. While this is very late in the year for approval of our application, we believe the process is still on track for funding

We have received most of the reimbursements for last year's telephone bills that were paid in full. While we pay reduced bills for Internet and Distance Learning services, this is a normal process to receive our reimbursements



for local and long distance phone services the following year.

The process for next years application is already underway as well. The application window has opened and closes in mid-February. We don't anticipate the processes will include any major changes this year.

Media Center (Shannon Clouse)

The Media Center has had a busy month. There have been requests from teachers for books, videos and DVD's about Atoms, Transportation, Genetics, Substance Abuse (drugs and alcohol), Electricity, Energy (kinetic), Simple Machines, Magnets, the Human Body, for the Yu'pik Dance kit, the Sug'aq (cloth doll) kit, books to teach Power Point, Excel, Word and the Internet and also for Solids, Liquids and Gasses. There have also been professional development books and teacher directed videos checked out to help facilitate Literatures Circles in the Junior High classroom.

Our English teacher in Koliganek contacted the Media Center about a Shakespeare unit that will be taught in the classroom after Christmas break. Oedipus the King, the Merchant of Venice, and Richard III were ordered and will be added to our Shakespeare collection. Other titles such as Cyrano De Bergerac, Edward Albee's The Zoo were also ordered to be added to



our collection.

The Media Specialist also had a lengthy discussion with one of the Alaska State Mentors about the services and materials that the Media Center provides, and now the other teacher mentors are going to encourage the teachers they work with in SWRS to utilize the Media Center when they are in need of materials for their students and classrooms.

RIF

All sites except one have completed their third RIF distribution. Our program proposal is due on the 17th of December, and will be completed as soon as our last site has their distribution. Our site coordinators will begin to order new books for the next contract year in January 2009.

Battle of the Books

Our first Battle of the Book "Practice" battle will be held on December 9th. There will be teams from Togiak, Clarks Point, Manokotak and New Stuyahok participating in the 3/4, 5/6, 7/8 and High School levels. The practice battles that we hold via our Distance Delivery equipment get our teams excited about reading the books chosen for Battle of the Books, get them familiar with the video conferencing equipment and also get our teams ready for the district battles that are held in February.



FEDERAL & STATE PROGRAMS Jon Clouse, Federal/State Programs Director

Several of our schools have been chosen to participate in the National Indian Education Study. The National Assessment of Education Progress and a follow-up survey is administered to 4th and 8th grade students in the selected schools in February of 2009. The district is working closely with principals to get 100% of the required parent permission forms for the survey returned. For more information see the Spotlight section below.

No Child Left Behind

Schools receiving Title I funds are required to either create or review and update a parent involvement policy. The staff, parents, and site principals are in the process of reviewing the current parent involvement polices of their particular school. Changes are made to the parent involvement policy based upon the feedback from the stakeholders at each school. The parent involvement policy is a guide to increase positive interaction and involvement between the school and parents.

The 2008-2009 consolidated No Child Left Behind (NCLB) application has been revised based upon the suggestions from the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development. Changes to the NCLB application consist of clarifications and adding information about the activities funded by the title grants. The application has been approved by the state and approved budgets for the title grants will sent from the state soon.

Spotlight: National Indian Education Study (NIES)

The National Indian Education Study (NIES) is a national research project designed to help policymakers and educators make decisions regarding the educational experiences of American Indian and Alaska Native students. The first part the study is the National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP), which assesses the reading and mathematics skills of students. The second part of the study is a survey that asks about the use of native languages and cultural views in the curriculum as well as the interactions between the school and native communities. The NIES is given to 4th and 8th grade students from selected schools around the nation. Several of our schools have been selected including:

- Chief Ivan Blunka School 4th & 8th grade
- Clarks Point School 4th grade
- Manokotak 'Nunaniq' School 4th & 8th grade
- Togiak School 4th grade
- Twin Hills School 4th grade
- William Sonny Nelson School 8th grade

The results from the NIES have been used to develop a professional development series for educators called Digital Teacher Workshops. The training takes instructional leaders and teachers through a series of workshops in the areas of general math, geometry, literature, and language in an effort to become highly effective teachers of American Indian and Alaska Native students. Exit letters were sent to the parent/ guardians of those students that have been exited.

21st Century Grant Proposal

The application for the 21st Century Community Learning Center was submitted on December 5th. The early childhood education program is the focus of the grant. The intention is to acquire the funding necessary to run the early childhood education program effectively so that parents and children receive the maximum benefit.

Service Providers Visit

November flew by, although some of the planes didn't! We had four of our related service providers in Dillingham ready to fly to sites this month. Our PT was weathered out for 3 days! Our speech pathologist, Alissa Thurman, lost 3 days of on-site services because of weather. To deal with this problem we will be building a VTC (video teleconference) schedule starting in January as a back up for these situations. This constrains our therapists from doing hands-on therapy, but it is better then their losing the contact time with students. At sites where the video equipment is in classrooms, this will present a problem, but we will continue to work out the details.


Reading and testing materials have been arriving in the district office to update the teaching materials have available for instruction. As the

Spotlight: Child Find (ages 3-5)

Each year, Special education is responsible for identifying pre-schoolers who may be experiencing developmental delays. This year, as in previous years, the PAT teachers have been conducting these screenings for students not already in the Head Start program, using the Brigance Developmental Screening. The areas assessed are:

- Language relevant for learning to read
- Number concepts relevant for learning arithmetic
- Social/Emotional relevant to school success
- Fine Motor related to learning to writing
- Gross Motor related to overall coordination

Children identified as developmentally delayed are referred to specialists for additional testing to determine if the child has a disability that is interfering with their age-appropriate development. Often, these children haven't been exposed to enriching language or concepts but simply need to have the opportunity to learn them. In years past, the PAT program has given the parents of these children insight into home activities they can do to help their child.



district moves forward toward an Rtl approach to instruction, it's clear that our special education teachers will be doing more of the Tier-III interventions. In assessing the district resources, it appeared that the diagnostic piece of the Tier-III intervention was missing. In the New Year, special education teachers will be training on these new assessments.

SESA

SESA (Special Education Services Agency) reinstated services for our students with multiple disabilities this month. Rob LeFevre has worked throughout Alaska helping districts to develop programs for students who have very unique needs in rural areas. SESA is located in Anchorage and has video capability. Rob will be scheduling VTC at the sites where he has students.

Distance Delivery Training

We have been using the distance delivery capability of this district to reach teachers new to teaching and special education in October. It has been a valuable resource during a time when budget constraints inhibit travel. By logging into the website for our special education documents, I am able to demonstrate in real-time some of the more subtle legal requirements of the IEP. We've also used the distance delivery to allow me to actually conduct an IEP meeting for inexperienced teachers assigned to special education case loads. During such meetings, an informal confidentiality agreement is signed to assure that others are not in the room or within earshot of the meeting.

from the nomination letter "Patricia Wick of Togiak School has continually striven for the highest levels of student engagement. Over the years she has done her best to stay on top of



classroom technology and teaching methods for its integration. This year, she successfully integrated a wall mounted, projector & SmartBoard combination system in her classroom. This system allows for smooth transitions from teacher directed to student led lessons such as interactive learning games. In addition to the Smart-Board system, she has also acquired an Airliner wireless writing tablet, which allows for total freedom about the classroom while writing electronically on the SmartBoard. To further encourage student interaction, Patricia has obtained a class set of Senteo clickers, which allows for spontaneous formative assessments. In combination with her growing skills at lesson creation via Smart products (and accessories), she is quickly become an educational technology whiz.

Computer Assisted Instruction (Corey Evans)

Most of the students completed the Alaska Computerized Formative Assessment (ACFA) system in October to provide further data as to the student's performance on specific Grade Level Expectations (GLE). We provided training and discussion during our last administrative meeting. We held three distance delivered training sessions to assist teachers in administering the assessments and utilize the data afterwards to refine instruction.

Site Technology Support

Many hours of troubleshooting and support have been provided to the sites via remote access and a site visit was made to Twin Hills to completely upgrade and re-wire their network.





A Commitment to Excellence

In the 6-8 grade class, the students are working on the writing strand - Writing Using a Variety of Forms. The students are going to integrate a writing piece along with technology to produce an Imovie for the Christmas program. Topics include; What Christmas means to me, What I Enjoy Over Christmas break, and it wouldn't be complete without a (short) wish list for Christmas. In Mrs. Simms' class, the 5th grade reading is using informational texts and stories to practice finding the main ideas and details that support those main ideas. In Social Studies, Ms. Bates has her students working with the different states and placing them together like a puzzle, with each student having one of their own. Ms. Bates' (a lifelong Texan) also assures me that her students know that Alaska is larger than Texas, California and Wyoming combined. In Mrs. Burke's

class, they are working on making simple inferences through reading a story and filling in information the author doesn't give. In math, they are using models to help understand area.

This information is assisting with identifying and addressing contributing factors of our at-risk students.





Addressing Our Challenges

To address the numerous academic challenges that we face, we have responded in a variety of positive ways: We offer study hall and tutoring services to students four days each week, with an activity bus run for transportation afterward. We have established a committee to consider alternatives for students who are not succeeding with the traditional program. Additionally, we have a committee carefully reviewing promotion, advancement, and retention of students who are not performing at grade level. We are formulating a plan to intensify Language Arts instruction to the upper elementary students in the months leading into state testing. Our student council was called into action by the principal at a special meeting to address arising issues of student motivation and falling grades. We will implement the Raising Student Voices and Participation process that several council members have been trained in to supplement the efforts of the staff, and to increase the likelihood of the effectiveness of our efforts.

We continue to work very diligently on our school-wide goals of approving achievement. Thank you for this opportunity to recognize the efforts of our staff and students toward achieving those goals.

The K-3 class is making good progress in Saxon Math and writing with Open Court. The kids get very excited as they sound out new words and make connections that they couldn't do a month ago. The Alaska Learning Lab is meeting 4 days a week after school. We can see marked improvement since they began meeting on October 6th. The students really enjoy this time and we think it will make a huge difference in the SBA test scores.

Plans for our Christmas program, scheduled for December 17th, are underway and cookie baking and decorating are in the plan.
