

Site Visits

While the weather was not conducive for site travel on the first day of the school year, Superintendent Piazza was able to make site visits to all seven sites within the first two weeks. On Thursday, August 25th, Dave and Associate Superintendent, Steve Noonkesser were able to make a quick visit to the school at Aleknagik. The following day, Dave and Steve were able to arrive at the Manokotak 'Nunaniq' School before the start of the school day. Superintendent Piazza, even had a chance to set up a new copy machine for the school in addition to visiting the students and staff in the classrooms. On Sunday, August 28th in the afternoon, Dave was able to fly into Togiak. He spent all day Monday visiting the classrooms. After spending the night in Togiak, on Tuesday morning, Dave flew over to Twin Hills just as school was beginning to spend the day and returned to Dillingham that afternoon. The following morning on Wednesday, August 31st, the fog lifted in time for an early morning departure for Dave to arrive at the William "Sonny" Nelson (Ekwok) School before school started as well. Dave spent most of the day at the school and took a boat ride up the river to the "Chief" Ivan Blunka (New Stuyahok) School where he had a little bit of time to visit the classes in the afternoon and then spent the night. On Thursday morning, Dave visited with the students and staff and then flew up to Koliganek for the remainder of the afternoon. After spending the night in Koliganek, Superintendent Piazza, was able to visit each classroom again and returned to Dillingham in the early afternoon.


Exploration Week Teaching Opportunity



It was an amazing feeling to have a student comment, when I was visiting Aleknagik, that her father was part of Aleknagik's last high school graduating class and that she was happy to be able to attend school at home. This has been a long time coming and while we are still working out a lot of details and fine tuning programs to work in smaller schools, we have ten students in Aleknagik and five in Twin Hills in high school.

Exploration Weeks

After a number of years of discussion with students, parents and community members, we are finally happy to be moving more culturally-related and regionally-focused, career & technical education (CTE), and fine arts courses back into our students options. During the week of September 12-16, 2016 middle and high school students at our sites participated in a new type of course. Week-long, special topics courses for either a half or full day are being offered. Topics range widely and include cooking, art, cultural activities, vocational and business education among others. Students were able to choose from a wide variety of course and reports from sites are that student are excited and enjoying themselves. This

new type of course opens a door for staff to teach on topics they are truly passionate about and students to pursue studies in areas not available for a number of years in our schools. It has been an exciting week.

BBRCTE

This year we also began hosting courses in conjunction with our partner school districts for the Bristol Bay Region Career and Technical Education Consortium. Our first course was a fabrication and design course hosted by the UAF Bristol Bay Campus. It has been exciting and students are enjoying the learning.











Instructional Team Notes

Exploration Week

- Teachers and principals began preparing for Exploration Weeks last may when teachers sent proposals for new courses; from cooking to sewing (both traditional and modern), from music to drawing, and from building computer programs to building furniture.
- Supplies were purchased last spring to take advantage of the reduced cost of shipping by barge versus air. With much help from the business office and maintenance department, most supplies were received, inventoried, and distributed by the time teachers arrived on site for the first day of school.
- Some courses were developed during new staff inservice and teachers worked diligently to complete thorough course descriptions – a necessary step in recording grades as well as ensuring that students have verifiable skills on their transcripts. Student Support Specialist Kyle Schneider was instrumental in helping teachers to meet a tight deadline.
- Teachers have felt invigorated and empowered by the opportunity to use their interests outside of academics as instructional opportunities, as well as a chance to bond and develop rapport with students.



- Students have responded favorably to the opportunity to pursue non-academic activities; many of which compliment their day-to-day activities outside of school and expand their knowledge base thus allowing them to become more efficient and productive in daily tasks such as home and vehicle repair, or collecting and storing food. Other courses have allowed students to venture into pursuits that are normally reserved for students at larger schools.
- Regardless of the activity students participated in this week, even if it was not their first choice, the overwhelming response has been, "This is something that I got to choose. Where I wasn't told, 'You are doing this.' But instead was asked, "What would you like to do?"

Fall Inservice

• This fall inservice was focused on the new direction of our district. At the new teacher training the focus was centered around our district's vision and goals, our Yup'ik program, and our curriculum/resource programs that are implemented within our schools. The all staff inservice was focused on our district's new calendar equipped with Exploration Weeks, Plato training, and Reading Mastery training.

Academic Vocabulary

• This year we are running two programs to build our students tier 2 and tier 3 vocabulary skills. Tier 2 our cognitive verbs that allow us to read to understand. Tier 3 words are our content specific words. The

elementary staff is using a program called SpellingCity and secondary is using Vocabulary.com. Word lists are getting finalized and incentive programs will be in place by October 1st. For the month of August, our top students are:

PLATO

• The adoption of the online curriculum, Plato, is off and running. It was a busy month of course building and class assignments. Currently our High School English, US History, and Government/Citizenship courses are being taught using Plato exclusively. Our small sites with new high schools are using it as a support program in classrooms that may have more then two content areas being instructed. We continue to work out the challenges any new program has and continuously thank our teachers for their support and willingness to join the district on a path of continuous improvement.

Technology Team Notes

In the midst of a busy start of year, we rolled out new equipment purchased in the spring to instructional paraprofessionals and teachers. In the midst of the busy start of the school routine, Les and Corey have just completed a trip to every site in the district to bring new computers to staff. After this last round of technology visits students, teachers, and instructional aides now all have new computers.

The technology team has been busy engaged in many other activities including:

- MAP testing is underway and will be completed this Friday the 16th. NWEA has made some changes to the system and now all of our elementary student are taking the MAP test on their iPads. This change over caused some issues during the first week of testing at a couple sites but Corey was able to work with the sites that had problems and now testing is operating smoothly.

State & Federal Programs Jon Clouse, Director

Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)

The 2016-2017 school year will be a transition/ planning year between the regulations in NCLB and ESSA. The Title grants will be administered under the regulations outlined in NCLB while the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development develops plans and procedures to make the transition to the regulations outlined in ESSA. The plans include developing a new accountability system, which is a change from the current but "frozen" Alaska School Performance Index (ASPI). Other changes include school improvement identification and support process, and determining the criteria for "out-of-field" and "effective" teachers. Jon Clouse sits on the state-wide ESSA Advisory committee and provides feedback from the perspective of SWRS and rural Alaska. Site Visit: School Improvement

• EED has continued to "freeze" the star-rating for schools because AMP assessment was cancelled last year. That being said, Togiak continues to be identified as a Focus school and will receive additional support from EED for school

- improvement including school improvement funding. Last year, this funding was used to implement the first year of the Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) process. This is not a program than can be purchased, it is a process that is customized around the values and culture of the school and community. One of the main goals is to use positive feedback to reinforce the desired behavior. Behavioral data is used to identify students that need additional support and interventions, as well as, identify trends during specific times and/or locations where additional process need to be implemented. Togiak has a core PBIS team that meets regularly to review data, make adjustments, and celebrate successes.
- Jon Clouse travelled to Togiak (August 15th and 16th) during their inservice in August that focused on the continued implementation of Tier I and Tier II strategies with the PBIS process. The district has contracted with a Marilyn Rosene, former Dillingham Elementary principal, as a facilitator for the implementation of PBIS. Marilyn successfully brought PBIS into the Dillingham Elementary School and will work with the Togiak staff throughout the year to help implement the process effectively.

Title IC: Migrant Education

Pauline Askoak (New Stuyahok), Martha Fox (Togiak), Virginia Bartman (Manokotak), Pam Johnson (Nushagak River Villages), Natalia Ishnook (Koliganek), Corina Owens (small sites), Susie Brito (at-large), Kyle Schneider (district office) and Jon Clouse attended the annual migrant recruiting training in Anchorage on August 30th and 31st. This year is a little different because all of the data from the recruiting process will be entered into an online web system. The state of Alaska Migrant

Education Program, SWRS, and five other districts are piloting this new system. We are the first state and districts to complete the recruiting process through this online web system.

In other exciting news, the SWRS migrant program provided summer school to up to 20 migrant student at Manokotak School from July 18 – July 29th. The average number of 22 students attended each day. The focus was on culturally relevant reading and vocabulary, physical activity, and an art/science activity. We also partnered with Dillingham City School District to provide a summer school camp in Ekuk/Clark Point. There were 20 students that attended the Ekuk/Clarks Point summer camp between June 29th and July 20th. Student received reading material and instruction in reading, culturally-based traditions (dance, crafts, etc.) and fishery related math. Lastly, DCSD and SWRS partnered to provide literacy events and books to students in Lewis Point and we were able to bring Deanna Baier to Lewis Point for a science camp.

Career & Technical Education: BBRCTE

By the time you read this report, the first session of the Bristol Bay Regional CTE (BBRCTE) program will have concluded. In review, the BBRCTE program is a partnership between Lake & Peninsula School District, Bristol Bay Borough Regional School District, Southwest Region School District, and recently, Dillingham City School District. There will be four different sessions throughout the year in which students can apply to attend. There continues to be a number of sessions offered in Naknek/King Salmon including and SWRS is hosting the first ever session in the Dillingham area as part of this program. SWRS had six students selected to attend the sessions in Naknek/King Salmon and seven

students to attend the session in Dillingham. It is exciting to work with other districts to create a program that serves students from the entire region, through collaboration and sharing of resources. Included is a list of the courses being offered through BBRCTE this year.

Other Information

There were seven students that earned either ½ or 1.0 elective credit for fishing or other employment during the summer. The School Board adopted STW100 School to Work Experience course designed to provide elective credit based on work experience. The employment included commercial fishing and working at local businesses.



Student Information & Support Specialist: Kyle Schneider

Powerschool University

During the summer, Kyle Schneider attended a weeklong PowerSchool training. Over the course of the week, attendees take eight classes for a total of twenty-four hours of instruction. He took courses focused on preparing the district for a transition to the new gradebook.

Inservice

Kyle presented on the changes that had been made to PowerSchool during the summer at the principal's inservice. He also provided training at the teachers' in-service to show teachers how to use their new gradebooks.

School Photography

During the last week of August and the first week of September, Richard Johnson from Purnell

Photography traveled to all of our schools and took pictures. He photographed the staff and students in New Stuyahok, Koliganek, Ekwok, and Aleknagik during the week of August 29th to September 2nd. The following week he traveled to Manokotak, Twin Hills, and Togiak.

Migrant Ed Recruiting

Kyle Schneider traveled to Anchorage at the end of August to receive training from EED's Migrant Education Program on recruiting and managing Migrant Education records. Staff from Togiak, Manokotak, New Stuyahok, and Koliganek, plus several "at-large" recruiters also traveled into Anchorage to learn about the new Migrant Education computer system. Migrant recruiting at the three smaller schools will be conducted from the District Office.

Children's eligibility is determined by whether or not they have made qualifying "moves". A "move" means that a child took a trip of more than 20 miles for either commercial or subsistence fishing and stayed away from home for 7 nights / 8 days throughout the year. Children can also qualify if they "move" to another district for the required length of time (this can be for fishing or certain other activities). Most of the students we recruit have either "moved" to fish camp or to Dillingham for commercial or subsistence fishing in the summer.

Exploration Weeks

Kyle has spent quite a few hours preparing PowerSchool to handle the exploration weeks that are starting this year. He was able to prepare scheduling templates that principals and teachers could use that helped automate the scheduling process.



Counseling & Assessment Specialist: Steve Ito

The Alaska Developmental Profile for Kindergarten and first grade students that have not attended a public school will begin within a window from September 15th to November 1st. The purpose of the Alaska Developmental Profile is to identify, record and summarize the skills and behaviors students demonstrate at the beginning of their kindergarten year, based on teacher observations. Student skills and behaviors are defined by goals and indicators in five domains Physical Well-Being, Health, and Motor Development; Social and Emotional Development; Approaches to Learning; Cognition and General Knowledge; and Communication, Language, and Literacy.

The annual District Test Coordinator training sponsored by Alaska Department of Education and Early Development was attended. Updates to statewide assessment protocol and procedure were reviewed. Pertinent application district-wide will be implemented throughout the school year.

The State of Alaska, Department of Education & Early Development (DEED) is requesting information from qualified vendors who can provide, administer, score, and report results for a NEW statewide summative assessment to replace the former Alaska Measures of Progress (AMP). This new assessment will target English language arts, mathematics, and science, and will be administered annually beginning no later than March 28, 2017. The purpose of this RFI is to identify vendors that are interested in and can deliver assessments to meet the state specific identified needs within the timeline and cost constraints. DEED anticipates issuing a contract for 2016-2017 and will consider annual renewal options through 2020-2021. DEED estimates a budget of no more \$4,450,000 for 2016-2017 for the implementation of a new assessment.

National Indian Education Association: World Café and Training

Wally Gust, School Board Member and I participated in this one- day session in Fairbanks. The participants included educators most of whom were from the interior. We went through a series of activities – first asking the participants who were assigned groups to respond to this question, "In the next 50 years what do we want our Native education system to look like?" Followed with pinpointing the 3 main priorities for NIEA as we move into our next 50 years? What resources, tools, etc. will education systems need to create this future for our students? Some of the responses included:

- Revitalize our Alaska Native Language
- Alaska Native History needs to be studied within the schools. (That means documenting and developing high quality materials).
- Needs to be a strong paraprofessional training (language and culture) program developed with the universities and school districts working together.
- Cultural standards need to be addressed in all our schools and
- That NIEA have a regional office here in Alaska.
- The session also provided an overview of Every Student Achieves Act (ESSA).

They encouraged all the districts to continue to apply for grants so that the need can be transmitted and become visible. Therefore, the district has developed a language survey that will be conducted this fall with all our K-12 students.



New Teacher Orientation

Angutekayak Louise Gloko of Manuquutaq, Ukayiq Martha Fox of Tuyuryak and Pi'piqAnastasia Ishnook McDowell assisted with the new teacher orientation. The participants were introduced to the Yup'ik language, cross-cultural communication situations and different techniques that would help in those situation especially with their students; each presenter presented an introduction to the villages with photos of the community and/or people engaging in cultural activities. This followed with a field trip down to Kanakanak beach where participants were able to see a subsistence set net site (Steve Ito) in action. Afterwards those who wished to participate in cutting the fish were given the opportunity. The session concluded with the participants learning the Akutaq dance (which they performed during the district wide in-service).



New Teacher Orientation

We welcome all our new teaching and administrative staff enrolled in the Ed. F 456 Orientation to Teaching in Rural Alaska (18 have enrolled representing all the sites) with a site based cultural mentor who will introduce them to the community and engage them in some of the subsistence activities.

The cultural mentors for each of the site are:

Jessica Mark in Twin Hills, Panta Paul in Manokotak, Mickia Walcott in New Stuyahok, Ivan Gumlickpuk in Koliganek, David Williams in Ekwok, and Jeneva Andrews in Aleknagik.

Special Education
Sherry Becker, Director

The special education department welcomes back five returning special education teachers and would like to extend a big welcome to five new to district special education teachers this school year. The five new teachers include Nicole Wagner in New Stuyahok, Alyssa Hawkins in Ekwok, Maggie Gray in Aleknagik, Mickey Pender in Twin Hills and Shuk Osborne in Togiak. There is now a certified special education teacher at each of our school sites and it is very exciting to have such a great group of teachers supporting our students with special needs this year.

There has been a lot of activity already this school year with seven special education students exiting from the district, two new incoming students already receiving special education services, and eleven new referrals that are currently going through the eligibility process.

The special education director met with BBAHC Infant Learning Program (ILP) and local HeadStart staff on August 2, 2016 to review and revise the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between our agencies. This MOU covers the state/federal requirements for children transitioning from IDEA Part C (ILP children ages 0-3) to IDEA Part B (school district students ages 3-21) for special education services.

Trainings Provided and Travel

All new to district special education teachers participated in a full day of special education training on Monday, August 8, 2016. Topics included policies/procedures, TIENET training, hearing/vision screening training, etc. All returning and new to district special education teachers participated in specialized training provided to us via distance by the Special Education Service Agency (SESA) on Saturday, August 13, 2016. Topics for this training included Introduction to Hearing Loss/How Hearing Loss Effect the Educational Environment; Augmentative/Alternative Communication Systems (low-tech and high tech solutions); Data Collection for monitoring progress on IEP Goals; and Behavior and Communication. District-wide Inservice on August 11-12, 2016 topics included training for Child Find and for Confidentiality. Additionally, all staff were provided with an introduction to TIENET and detailed instruction on how to complete an Individual Instruction Plan for students going through the RTI/ Intervention process and for students that may eventually be referred for a special education evaluation and/or grade retention.



Business Office Ryan Ayars, Business Manager

The Alaska Department of Education & Early Development has reviewed and approved the district's FY2017 School Operating Fund Budget. This Budget will be reviewed once more after the State receives our FY16 annual audit. During this review our fund balance will be tested for compliance along with ensuring we met the minimum expenditure for instruction requirement.

Altman, Rogers, & Co. performed the final audit fieldwork. They said our processes throughout the year are working great and are in compliance. We made a handful of suggested corrections, took notes and continue to fine tune our processes. They hope to deliver a final copy of the audit in time for the board meeting in October.

The annual review and update of our Section 125 Plan has been completed. Our Section 125 Plan document details all of the benefits we offer and establishes rules for eligibility and elections. Each year it is reviewed in order to ensure it meets the requirements and regulations of section 125 of the Internal Revenue Code. We will continue to monitor its accuracy as changes may occur.

Our new business software, Infinite Visions, is operational. With this new software we are able to manage our financials and personnel through one system will encouraging a paperless environment. The software has helped streamline process's improving accuracy and efficiency. We have been able to offer employees a portal to access their personal data. As with any conversion we are still working through and fine tuning the software to best meet the needs of the district.

The new Timeclock Plus software has been installed and nearing a go live date. We hope to have a smooth conversion from our old discontinued Timeclock Plus software in the next couple weeks. With this new software the data from the employees who use a time clock will seamlessly be imported into our account software without any manual entry. Currently, all the timeclock data for the entire district is manually entered into the accounting software by one person.

The special education director provided training to Manokotak classified and certificated staff on August 16, 2016. This training was entitled "Trauma: Educational Impact and What Schools Can Do to Build Resiliency". This training provided Manokotak 'Nunaniq' School staff with a basic understanding of what Adverse Childhood Experiences are, how these traumatic experiences can affect a child's education and what school staff can do to help build resiliency through the use of interventions for establishing safety, empowerment, collaboration, choice, and trust. This training discussed various strategies and resources to help the school staff to create a trauma-sensitive school.

The special education director completed site visits to Koliganek on August 29, 2016 for the purpose of completing an early entry screening. The director visited Aleknagik School and provided some mandatory special education paraprofessional training on August 30, 2016 and then visited Twin Hills to provide teacher/paraprofessional training and support on Sept 6, 2016.

K-8 sites throughout Southwest Region School District began last spring and Aleknagik happily welcomed nine (9) high school students on the first day of school. We also welcome Ms. Margaret Gray to our staff. Ms. Gray is teaching secondary ELA, history, and health.

The first few weeks of school have been quite busy as all secondary students selected the Exploration Week topics in which they are interested, Purnell Photography was here for community and school pictures, and the first round of MAP Assessments has been completed.

Curriculum-wise, we are in the fifth year of using the science kits for all K-5 students. The students have enjoyed all of the hands-on activities the last four years and I can foresee that enjoyment continuing. We are in the sixth year of using the Reading Mastery program in grades K-5 and in the past five years have seen wonderful gains in the students' reading abilities. This is the third year with GO Math! Although there were some hiccups during the first year of implementation, the second year was smoother so we look forward to seeing the students' level of comfort and understanding increase again this year. We will continue utilizing Reflex Math; the supplemental online math program to assist with fluency in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

A new program for the secondary students (grades 6-12) is Exploration Weeks. The first Exploration Week was held September 12th -16th and had the following course offerings: Introduction to Demolition and Construction, Skin Sewing, Community Service, Upcycling, and Academic Improvements. The students looked like they enjoyed the change of pace and activities and their finished projects are something they will remember for years to come.

As the new school year begins, we will be continuing the following programs/activities:

School is back in full swing here in Ekwok. Our entire staff worked diligently to help ensure our school would be inviting to the students and the community. As we are new, our staff has been invaluable during the whole process. We have worked with the students' schedules to allow for frequent movement and expelling excess energy. There are three recess periods per day plus P.E. As part of our welcome back week, we emphasized the fact that there is a time and place for everything. During class time, we expect full attention and hard work. With schedule designs, the children are never in class for more than one hour without a recess or P.E. in between. We have found this to be an effective way to manage childhood energy while maintaining focus in the classroom. Another implementation this year has been a focus on character growth and the goal of becoming effective student citizens. Our character traits for this year are Optimism, Grit, Social-Intelligence, Self-Control, Curiosity, Gratitude and Zest. Students are not only expected to exhibit behavior consistent with these traits, they are rewarded for being positive student citizens.

My wife, Alyssa, teaches Reading and ELA for K-6 while I teach Math, Science, Social Studies and Health. We feel reading is the backbone of any subject so additional emphasis is placed on our students' fluency and comprehension. We also utilize an Intervention Period into our daily schedule. This period is used for Reflex Math, Spelling City, completing unfinished assignment or one-on-one intervention. This flexibility allows us to work closely with the students in order to meet the individual needs of their education.



We have also implemented a couple programs focusing on character and student leadership. One program is our Student of the Month. Two students are chosen each month for the awards based upon a

list of character and leadership criteria. This month our K-2 student is Madison Kazimirowicz and our 3-6 student is Cristian Valdez. Both of these students have exhibited polite attitudes in addition to positive peer leadership. We firmly believe student growth in our character traits should be rewarded in addition to praise for academic performance.

Mrs. Alice is in charge of our Extensions Period in addition to classroom aide. As an established member of the community, she has been a wonderful asset with incorporating native culture into our daily schedule. During her extensions period, Mrs. Alice works with Art and Technology. The children have made dream catchers, paintings and pot holders so far this year. They are very excited about the upcoming art projects this year. Mrs. Alice has been working with the students on typing course during Technology class. As the year progresses, the children will hopefully learn the basics of word processing, spreadsheets and basic graphic designs. Mr. David Williams is our Yup'ik teacher and the students are doing great while learning the native language. They are currently working on a project using local plants.

We just finished MAP testing and are settling into our routine for the remainder of the year. It has been a wonderful ride so far and we have learned so much while also teaching. I look forward to having a great year in Ekwok while focusing on student growth.

Start of a New Year

We have had a great start to our year in Koliganek. We opened the school year with an assembly to introduce the new staff: Michael Lee as principal, Dalton Hawkins as HS Science and Math, and Richard Coppin as HS Social Studies and Language Arts. On August 24th we had an open house for parents to meet the teachers and to allow completion of paperwork required for sports and computer use. Overall we had a great start to the year and are excited for all of the wonderful things to come.

New School Progress

There are still a few unresolved issues from the new school construction. The maintenance department has been working with the builders to ensure everything will work as designed. The old bleachers have been removed and new bleachers will be installed during the week of September 19th. This will greatly increase the number of people that can comfortably attend events in the school due to the larger seating capacity of the bleachers. Other minor issues have already been resolved and the remaining issues will be resolved during the week of the 19th. None of these prevented the school from opening and operating at the start of the year, but we want to ensure that we are getting all of the items required from the builders. Fall Assessments

Map testing went extremely smooth in Koliganek. We finished all testing prior to the deadline. The teachers did a great job preparing students and administering the test. The data from these assessments are being used as one measurement to ensure students receive the best reading and math interventions for their individual strength and weaknesses.

Extra-Curricular Activities

We have had a very good start with our cross country team. The team this year is very young and is composed of all middle school students. We have taken 1st place for Middle School Boys and Girls Cross Country races at Manokotak and our home meet in Koliganek. The team is excited to represent our school and village and will be attending meets at Chief Ivan Blunka School and Dillingham.

We have had 2 pep assemblies for our runners. We also recognized the positive behavior ticket winners for the month of August. Student that are caught following class expectations or assisting others are given Behavior Reward Tickets. The positive tickets are placed on the bulletin board in the cafeteria. Once monthly we take them and down and draw our winners from each grade / class level. The winners receive a coupon for a free slushy and popcorn at our next afterschool event.

At each pep assembly we also have a spirit contest between the elementary and MS/HS. The current team acts as the judge for the spirit competition. The elementary have dominated so far and won the Husky Mascot for the classrooms at both assemblies. The High School / Middle School has shown true spirit, but the elementary has significantly higher volume.

In Our Classrooms

The MS/HS students have been adjusting to the increased level of rigor and pace of the Plato classes. Most have been very receptive to the new format and all are doing well. The new schedule has allowed us to work on Academic Endurance and students' ability to maintain focus for longer periods of time. Most students enjoy being able to do their work on a computer after the lesson has been discussed. The MS/HS has prepared for the first Exploration Week and students are very excited for the opportunity to participate in different types of classes. As we continue on to the year as a school, our hope is to gain relationships with the community by understanding the culture and bringing it to the school and using it as something that grabs the attention of students as they are taught skills they will need to know in the future to survive our modern world.
