#### **Superintendent Travel**

Superintendent Piazza and Associate Superintendent Steve Noonkesser participated in the Alaska Superintendents Association's (ASA) Fall Meeting held in the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District (KPBSD) in Seward last month.

The first day's pre-meeting activities began with a tour of the Seward High School. Principal Trevan Walker discussed the school's "hybrid high" model detailing the options that students have to personalize their educational experience. The tour continued onto AVTEC – Alaska's Institute of Technology's Culinary Academy facility. Here participants learned about the culinary programs offered, as well as, were treated to lunch provided by the AVTEC students. Then participants were then transported to AVTEC's



Combination Welding and Diesel/Heavy Equipment Technologies building. Instructors from both programs provided an overview of the coursework offered and the opportunities available for students who want to further their skills development in these trades. Finally, the tour concluded at the AVTEC Maritime Training Center's fire-fighter training area. A group of Lower Kuskokwim School District 9th grade students were participating in hands-on fire extinguisher training provided through Coastal Village Regional Fund programs.

The overarching theme to this year's meeting dealt with personalizing learning for each student. The meeting was led by Fairbanks North Star Borough School District Superintendent and ASA President Dr. Karen Gaborik. This year's program included welcome messages provided by KPBSD Superintendent Sean Dusek; Mike Navarre, Mayor Kenai Peninsula Borough; and Joe Arness, KPBSD Board of Education President. Pre-recorded video presentations by Senator Lisa Murkowski, Senator Dan Sullivan, and Congressman Don Young were presented as well.

Full group sessions included "What's going on in education?" presented by the ASA Executive Director, Dr. Lisa Skiles Parady; AASA Policy & Advocacy presented by Noelle Ellerson Ng from the National School Superintendents Association; Health Care Authority Study Overview presented by Natasha Peneda with the Alaska Department of Administration; virtual Keynote Address by Michael B. Horn on the future of education; and a panel discussion on Personalized Learning with Anthony Kim, CEO & Founder of Educational Elements, Dr. Suzie Alka Associate Superintendent for School Improvement at Yuma Arizona, Scott Bischoping, BOCES District Superintendent in New York State, and Dr. Matt Akin Superintendent at Huntsville City Schools in Alabama. National speakers also included Dr. Dan Domenech, Executive Director of AASA.

James Fields, President of the State Board of Education, Jerry Covey, and several superintendents who chaired committees of the Alaska Education Challenge provided an update to the strategic planning project as well. Senator Peter Micciche, Representative Mike Chenault, and Representative Paul Seaton led a legislative panel discussion focused on educational funding.

Additional Reports were presented regarding: the American Association of School Administrators (AASA) National Governing Board; the Mt. Edgecumbe Advisory Board; the Alaska School Activities Association (ASAA) and the Special Education Service Agency (SESA). Superintendent Piazza also presented to the group on the annual status of the Professional Teaching Practices Commission (PTPC).

Similar to the work completed by AASB at their annual conference, ASA participants also reviewed and adopted a set of Joint Position Statements that will be forwarded to the Alaska Association of Elementary School Principals, the Alaska Association of School Business Officials. These statements provide direction for the ASA board and members as the legislative session approaches.

As we head into late fall and winter is nearing, we have completed our first Exploration Week. Again this year, students and staff were excited to spend the week doing things we don't normally have the chance to do in our regular schedule. #### Site Travel

Steve traveled with Superintendent Piazza to the Fall Meeting of the Alaska Superintendent Association. The conference included tours of AVTEC in Seward and discussions with KPBSD about innovative programs providing student choice. Three days of meetings were filled with discussion of innovative programs and a focus at the state level on providing greater choice for students both in traditional core classes and electives as well. There was also a great deal of talk among superintendents about career and technical education and the need to return it to a prominent place in our districts' curricula. We were unable to attend the last day of the meetings due to events back here at home. Given the timing of things it was gracious of Pen Air to allow us to make last minute changes to our itinerary to get home sooner than planned.

Steve was also privileged to attend services in New Stuyahok, along with Jon Clouse, Federal Programs Director, for elder Nick Gumlickpuk, who passed recently. It was good for the heart to see the mark he left on his community and region with people from across the region in attendance.

#### **Instructional Team Notes**

#### **Exploration Week**

- Staff have become more familiar with the planning and ordering process. A major refinement has been the use of "Amazon Wish Lists" to place orders, which allows individual teachers to select their own products and then send them to District Office staff to compile and issue a single purchase order. Previously a separate purchase order had to be issued for each teacher's order.
- Curriculum Specialist, Charles Becker, organized an instructor's training for the Alaska Department of Fish and Game "Hunter Information Training" Program. Six Southwest Region Schools staff attended the training along with staff from the Alaska Wildlife Troopers and the United Sates Fish and Wildlife Service. This was a valuable opportunity to increase the number of SWRS staff qualified as Hunter Safety Instructors and to create a larger pool of instructor's for the broader Bristol Bay Region. It also allowed SWRS staff to build stronger relationships and share the district's vision with the members of the other agencies that attended, who were appreciative of the opportunity to attend a training locally. The course consisted of a policies and procedures training in the SWRS Boardroom on the evening of Friday, October 6th, followed by a half-day range safety activity at the Dillingham Firing Range and another half-day of testing and qualifications in the SWRS Boardroom on Saturday, October 7th.

Having these Qualified Instructors will give the district greater flexibility and adaptability in providing the
Hunter Information and Training Program, especially during Exploration Weeks. It will also give the
district a pool of experts to consult and take leadership on firearms safety training throughout the year
across all grade levels.

#### **Academic Vocabulary**

- Southwest Region schools continues to promote academic vocabulary district wide. All 6-12 students have a vocabulary.com account that access through PowerSchool and Clever. Each month, the top ten middle school/high school students across the district are honored for the number of words they have mastered. Students are encouraged to use the program at their leisure to increase their tier two and three vocabulary skills. First, second, and third place finishers receive a dollar value prize that each site will transfer to either student store credit or gas credit.

- Elementary students are also encouraged to build their academic vocabulary through Vocabulary Spelling City. Vocabulary Spelling City allows teachers to build word lists and spelling work and assign it out to students to work on via games and activities on student iPads.

#### **Mathematics Instruction**

• Students mastering their math facts is another focus for SWRS. We currently have 122 students that have used reflex math for 10 or more days this year, and of those students, they had beginning of the year fluency of 54% and current fluency of 65%. SWRS has set goals to have all students fluent in addition and subtraction facts by 2nd grade; multiplication and division facts 0 – 10 by third grade; and multiplication and division facts 0 – 12 by fourth grade.

- This past summer, a committee of elementary math teachers worked together to be trained in the Math Daily Review and Mental Math instructional practices. The MDR committee was formed to provide instructional support to all math teachers in the MDR and mental math practices. In addition, there was district wide training at the beginning of the year inservice and instructional support will be provided at a district level throughout the year. The vision and goals of Math Daily Review and Mental math are as follows:
- Vision: Building number sense and computational skills in our students to increase student achievement in Algebra.
- Goal: Our goal through the implementation of a Math Daily Review including daily mental math practice is to increase a student's RIT points by 1 to 1.5 grade level points in a school year.
- Upcoming Professional Development: Koliganek has PD scheduled October 16th. New Stuyahok has PD scheduled December 4th. District-wide PD is scheduled for November 20th.

#### **Technology Team Notes**

Corey and Les have made three site visits recently. The first visit was travel to Clarks Point with two GCI technicians to assist in getting the internet turned on for the Clarks Point school currently being held in the Clarks Village Council community building. The second visit was also to Clarks Point, during this visit Corey issued iPads as well as staff laptops and set-up a printer while Les continued work on the network. During their most recent site visit, to Aleknagik, Les and Corey deployed new printers to the school as well as wiring a network port to the new high school addition.

Corey's current projects include supporting the new printer deployments as well as continuing to iron out the glitches out of the new Apple School Manager integration with our JSS server to help us add some

new features to the districts iPad deployment. Les continues work on deployment projects for printers and continued network upgrades and support.

### State & Federal Programs Jon Clouse, Director

### Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA a.k.a. Title grants)

After working with a number of various stakeholders and committee work, the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) has submitted its state plan to the U.S. Department of Education for how it intends to implement the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). The plan address four main components including:

- Standards and Assessments
- Accountability
- District and School Support
- Educator Quality

Standards and Assessments – there were no changes to the standards so the 2012 version of the standards remain. The assessment implemented to determine student progress towards meeting the standards is called PEAKS. Last year was the first administration of the PEAKS assessment which is given to students third through ninth grade. The science assessment is administered to students in grades 4, 8, and 10.

**Accountability -** the accountability system as three main components including long-term goals, the new accountability indicators, and annual meaningful differentiation of schools (an index score from zero to 100 based on the indicators).

District and School Support – Schools needing extra support will be identified as either Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school or Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) schools. Designations are based on the performance in the accountability indicators, graduation rate, and subgroup performance.

Educator Quality – while "Highly Qualified" no longer exists, school districts will still track and report the number of teachers that are inexperience, out-of-field, and ineffective. The plan has a definition for each of these terms. The executive summary of the ESSA plan is included in the board packet.

#### Title I-C - Migrant Education

The migrant recruiting process continues! The recruiters are the critical piece to ensuring that we identify as many eligible students as possible. Recruiting has been completed for Koliganek, and Manokotak. We are making a number of follow-up calls to Togiak and Twin Hills because families are still planning on catching red fish. We are also following up with families in Aleknagik. The recruiting process is taking a little longer than normal because we don't have the number of recruiters that we did last year.

#### Career & Technical Education - Bristol Bay Regional CTE program (BBRCTE)

The first session of the BBRCTE program was completed in September. Thirty-three students from around the region participated in four different course offerings including Introduction to Fisheries, Computer Coding, Introduction to Aviation Careers, and Introduction to Healthcare Careers. SWRSD had students from five of our schools apply for various sessions. The second session of the BBRCTE program will occurring during week of November 6 through 10. There will be sessions in Heavy Equipment Operator, Home Energy Basics, Introduction to Nautical Skills, Emergency Trauma Technician, and Medical Terminology. The applications have been sent out and students will have been selected by the time of the October School Board Meeting.



### Student Information & Support Specialist: Kyle Schneider

#### **Fall OASIS Report**

The fall count period began on October 2nd and runs through October 27th. Kyle has been working this month to check the accuracy of student data and to update the Fall OASIS report that must be submitted to the state by November 10th. This report will contain data about every student enrolled in the district. The Alaska Department of Education and Early Development then uses the enrollment data contained in the report to determine funding levels.

#### **Migrant Recruiting**

As of October 9th, 137 students have been approved by the state as eligible for the Migrant Education program. We have submitted paperwork to the state for 38 more students. These numbers do not include potential migrant students who recruiters have yet to contact or students whose paperwork is in progress. At this point last year, we had 190 students approved and 18 students whose paperwork had been submitted but not yet approved. Recruiting has been slowed this year by the loss of one village-based recruiter and two district office based at-large recruiters. The deadline for having students approved as eligible for funding under the Migrant Education program is November 15th.

In past years, letters were sent to parents to notify them of their child's eligibility and the services offered under the program as soon as they were approved. The increased workload on district office staff due to the loss of recruiters means those letters won't go out until all students have been recruited.

#### **Impact Aid**

The Impact Aid count day is October 27th this year. The following week, Kyle will send out information to secretaries so that they can confirm students' information. Once students' information is confirmed, the district can compile it and begin the work to get our submission certified as correct by village entities, BBNA, and the state tax assessor.

The increased timeline for completing Migrant Education recruiting and parent notification will likely cause delays in completing the Impact Aid data collection and certification process.



Counseling & Assessment Specialist: Steve Ito

Applications have been approved by the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education (ACPE) to re-enroll SWRSD sites with the addition of Clarks Point, to the Alaska Career Information System (AKCIS). The Alaska Career Information System (AKCIS) is an annually updated, comprehensive career and educational research and exploration system for teens and adults. AKCIS is a dynamic web-based program that can easily navigate between occupational information, the related

programs of study, with the schools and programs nationwide that offer the training.

Completed administration training in the World-class Instructional Design and Assessment (WIDA)
Protocol for limited English proficient students. The World-class Instructional Design and Assessment materials assesses student abilities in all four language domains (Listening, Speaking, Writing, and Reading), and evaluates Social and Instructional English as well as academic language corresponding to the subject areas of Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies. The assessment tool for the WIDA training is the ACCESS 2.0 for ELLs, which is given annually to limited English proficient students during a testing window from February 1 through March 31.





### Yup'ik Studies Esther Ilutsik, Director

#### Cetuyaraq

September 12, 2017 went to Cetuyaraq to visit the Chief Ivan Blunka School and worked with Tat'iq, Anguk'aq and Arnayagaq. It was so exciting and encouraging to watch the positive engagement of the students . . . lots of pride in their names and reflected in their self-portraits. The teachers were excited for the students as they begin to develop their dioramas for their Yup'ik Only Rule class. I so look forward to reports as we begin to implement YOR year 2. And Arnayagaq students were so engaged in identifying berries that they have picked in Yup'ik. Quyana for working so hard and enjoying the work that all you do.

#### Iquaq

On September 18, 2017 went to Iquaq to visit with Arnangauq who is the Yup'ik Studies Instructor at the William "Sonny" Nelson School. Arnangauq has a self contained Yup'ik Studies classroom where he also teaches Reading Mastery and Math. Arnangauq will be pursing a teaching degree and that takes a lot of his time outside his school duties. This is so encouraging and we are pleased for his choice in this career. He is a natural in the classroom. Quyana Arnangauq.

#### **Qalirneq**

Made a day trip to Qalirneq September 19, 2017 to visit with Cikiar, Pi'pic and Darlene and her mentee Anne. It happened to be during e-week where the older children were engaged in a international cooking activity with Anne and Darlene. Cikiar was holding her regular Yup'ik sessions with the Kindergarten and 1st grade. Later in the afternoon three classes from the elementary level went on a berry picking expedition. It was so rewarding to watch the children so engaged in picking berries. They went to the end of the road and picked cranberries. Quyana for a great visit.

#### Manuquutaq

Traveled out to Manuquutaq on the 25th of September. Walked into Angutekayak's class where the students were engaged in, "Introduction to Yup'iaq" lesson. They were on task and even were getting assistance from their elder mentors. The instructor posed questions to the students and when the students didn't respond she would ask an elder. You would think that the elders were not paying attention to the lesson as they were busy with their sewing crafts but were on task. I then went to observe Tan'iq's YCC 201 class, Yup'ik Orthography where the students introduced themselves to me in Yup'ik. Then he and the students demonstrated the "KAHOOTS" using words from their book," A Practical Grammar of the Central Alaska Yup'ik Eskimo Language". The students were totally engaged and enjoyed the "tech" immediate responses of their choices of interpretation. Had arrived a little bit late too to observe Cungass'aq but was able to catch up on her. My observations ended with the Yup'ik Only Rule class where the students were working in groups with their picture flashcards.

#### Saguyak

Traveled out to Saguyak and worked with Yunguaq. We were able to put together a curriculum that he could use as he begins his exciting duty as Yup'ik Studies Instructional Aide. He will begin with self-portraits with their Yup'ik names (some he may have to do a little research) and begin the exercises of practicing Yup'ik names, introduce counting & colors with calendar activities. He is also supplementing the lesson by reading The Storyknife. Many of those stories were written by people from Clark's Point. Had a few minutes to go over the exercise, "Kituusit?" with the students and even introduced them to, "kuukissaaq" and received one when pronounced correctly. Quyana for a pleasant visit.

Arnayagaq of Cetuyaraq and Naatuu of Tuyuryaq and Esther attended the 2017 Alaska Cross Content Conference in Fairbanks, Alaska September 29-30, 2017. #### **Special Education Director Travel**

The special education director travelled to New Stuyahok, Koliganek, and Ekwok on September 18 – 21st. The purpose of these site visits includes completion of the kindergarten hearing/vision screenings, student observations and teacher training. It was an outstanding trip and my first site visit during Exploration Week. Students were learning a lot of interesting things this week! The special education director visited Clarks Point on Sept. 27th for the purpose of provided their special education paraprofessional with training and to deliver supplies necessary for student to work toward IEP goals. Finally, the special education director visited the school in Manokotak on Oct. 3 – 5th. The director spent a lot of time in the classrooms throughout the school supporting both students and staff during this visit. A couple of things stood out during this site visit that were very impressive: first, all students and staff were actively engaged in the learning process and secondly things seemed to flow so smoothly – especially the reading mastery groups. Nice job Manokotak staff!

#### **School Psychologist**

Our school psychologist travels included Aleknagik, Manokotak, Koliganek, New Stuyahok and Clarks Point. The purpose of these school visits included formal and informal observations, cognitive and academic evaluations, classroom behavioral support, and gifted/talented evaluations. These visits also provided the school psychologist with an opportunity to provide social/emotional/behavioral training for individual teachers/staff.


#### **SERRC Itinerant staff**

The itinerant physical therapist, Tarah Sweeney, made her first visit to our schools for the year. Tarah works with students in New Stuyahok, Ekwok, Manokotak, and Togiak. We are pleased to welcome Tarah back again to SWRS this year. Barbara McNinch is our new itinerant occupational therapist. She has lived in Alaska for over 20 years but this was her first visit to our region. Barbara worked with staff and students in Manokotak, Twin Hills, and Togiak. She will be visiting villages upriver later this month. Our new itinerant speech/language pathologist, Naomi Boswell is also new this school year and she will be working with students and staff in Koliganek, New Stuyahok, and Ekwok. Naomi's first visit to schools will be later this month.

#### **Professional Development**

The special education teachers participated in a two-hour afterschool inservice via polycom on September 14th. The title of this inservice was Trauma Informed Practices in Schools. We discussed topics such as Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), prevalence nation-wide and the results of more recent Alaska specific studies, how a child's ACE score and trauma impacts their educational experience, brain research related to trauma, resilience, strategies to create a traumasensitive school, executive functioning skills, and finally staff self-care to decrease the impact of potential vicarious trauma.

The special education teachers spent Saturday, September 30th in Dillingham learning from their peers. Ben Griese presented on Assistive Technology, Nicole Wagner presented her experience with a social/emotional curriculum called the Zones of Regulation, and Amy Arnold shared with us her experience in working with students that struggle with executive functioning skills. This was a day full of learning, including opportunities for hands-on practice. Thank you to our amazing presenters for this valuable information!

### William 'Sonny' Nelson School Amy Arnold, Principal/Teacher

The month of September has been a busy one here in Ekwok! We participated in E week doing Community Service. We formed a Committee to plan the events and trips to ensure that the community was involved in the process. During the week, we learned about the history of our community and how service to others kept the people alive and well. We learned about other types of communities and how they serve each other. One field trip took us out to the old landfill, where the EPA shared the history of the old landfill and the importance of keeping our environment clean and sustainable. We tied these issues in with the Yup'ik values related to respecting our land and resources. We baked cupcakes, picked berries, wove baskets, and delivered these gifts to the elders' homes. It was a very inclusive, heart-warming time for staff and students. We had one final field trip planned down to the original Ekwok Lodge, but weather did not permit travel. We will try to implement



this field trip in the spring. It involved learning the history of the settlement, subsistence topics, and cleaning up the area.

We elected candidates for Student Council. Students developed platforms based on ideas for change and school improvement. They wrote speeches, which were videotaped. We then put the videos into iMovie and had mini-lessons on the development of an iMovie. Students were actively engaged in the process of learning the roles and responsibilities of each office, as well as how others conduct their candidacy to gain votes. A strong discussion about ethics was held as well, as a result of a teachable moment. Of the entire week's learning, the student engagement in this particular discussion was the highlight.

The Alaska Department of Fish and Game came out to present to the students. The classroom discussion addressed their current project of measuring the water in the 5 rivers and creeks in Bristol Bay to which they are assigned. Klutuk Creek is one of the five that they are studying. The life cycles of the five types of salmon were discussed, as well as the water cycle. We then took students out to Klutuk Creek where the Fish and Game biologists set minnow traps and gathered macro invertebrates for students to identify. The students were highly engaged in the process, and the debrief demonstrated great retention of knowledge by the students.



### Koliganek School Deb Forkner, Principal

Koliganek School STEPP needs assessment has been completed and the school wide goals for this year are:

- By the end of the 2017-18 school year, 80% of all students will meet their expected growth rate on the MAP reading assessment.
- By the end of the 2017-18 school year, 80% of all students will meet their expected growth rate on the MAP math assessment.
- By the end of the 2017-18 school year chronic absenteeism for 6th-12th graders will decrease by 5%.

School strengths are that Koliganek School has a very positive school climate. There are very few discipline referrals, students generally get along well with each other and staff members. There is a strong consistent core of classified staff.

Staff and students are looking forward to the November Exploration week. The Middle and High School students will learn to make holiday foods and how to do wood burning to make signs. Elementary students will make dance fans, drums and learn a Yupik dance, learn to play recorders and make fur mittens. We are hopeful that more High School students will return to Naknek for courses as well.

Koliganek CSC, community members and students met with two artists, Apayo Moore and Alieen Walsh,

to discuss and plan art work for the new school. Both artist will be submitting drawing and creating pieces.

As the first fourth of the school year comes to an end we look forward to Parent/Teacher Conferences on October 26 and 27. Students are working hard and we are exciting to share their accomplishments with parents.

#### **Academics:**

Our current enrollment is at 73 students for K-6th and 51 students for 7-12th, with a total of 124 students. We did have a positive start. Everything is continuing to go well at Chief Ivan Blunka School! Our students, staff, and community have really taken ownership of the Yup'ik Value of the Month program, which for October is: "Be helpful to one another." It is so great to see everyone demonstrate these incredible values and to be appropriately recognized for doing so.

Exploration Week was a huge success in September, and we are already planning and looking forward to the November session. We will be offering the following secondary courses in November: Subsistence Meat Processing, International Cuisine, Wilderness Survival, Pioneering II, Wood Burning, Lure Making Business, American Sign Language, Ulu Making I & II, Intermediate Quilt Making, Advanced Qaspeq Making, and Academic Improvements. We are also hoping that several students get accepted into the BBRCTE sessions. In the elementary we will be offering: Yup'ik Dance, Bot Battles, Rube Goldberg Machines, Coding for Kids, Engineering, Wilderness Exploration, and the Art of Making Fry Bread. The students and staff are very excited about these highly engaging course offerings!

In our Professional Learning Communities, we will begin to develop professional growth and development plans with all of our staff. The certified staff will use iObservation and the Marzano teaching framework to develop their plan while the classified staff will use a tool that has been aligned with the components of their evaluation. Both sets of plans will allow staff members to choose target elements, use a scale to define a starting point and ending point, design goals and action steps, and reflect on their progress throughout the year. Our hope is that this process will help all of our staff be goal-oriented and grow as educators in our continued effort to provide students with every opportunity and the best possible education!

We were so very proud to have four student athletes qualify for and compete at the state cross-country championships. Both our high school and middle school teams have already come home as tournament champions from competitions in Togiak, Manokotak, and Aleknagik. We have also had a great turnout at practice for our wrestling program. The New Stuyahok Fabricators (NSF) have been active and recently donated customized t-shirts to the Wonhola family in loving memory of Coach Gloria Wonhola.
